

Getting Down to Basics: The Augsburg Confessions and Small Catechism

Sept. 11 – Nov. 19, 2020 class sessions

Orientation Thursday Sept. 10 at 7:30 Central Time

This course analyzes the history and development of the theology of *The Book of Concord*, especially the Augsburg Confession and Small Catechism, with a view to establishing the importance of their contents for the ministry of pastors, teachers, and congregations.

More specifically the student will:

- Become thoroughly familiar with the Augsburg Confession and Small Catechism;
- Understand the historical and theological context out of which they speak;
- Discover new ways to apply these teaching to life in today's parish.

Facilitator as Resource

The class facilitator will be familiar with the lectures and reading material, read student postings, and will be rotating the type of interface he uses with the student each week. The week that there is a live chat, the chat will be the interface. Other weeks the facilitator will be responding to either essays or to threaded discussions or give a general written response to the issues of that week.

The facilitator for this class is Dr. Eric Trozzo. Eric is an ELCA pastor who holds a PhD in Theology from Drew University. He is currently an affiliated researcher with Australian Lutheran College, in Adelaide, South Australia. Formerly, he served as Director of Lutheran Studies at Sabah Theological Seminary in Malaysia through ELCA Global Mission.

Orientation call Thursday September 10 at 7:30 PM Central Time: You will be enrolled in the course site the weekend proceeding the orientation phone call. Please take the following week to explore the course site. There are a number of tasks to do during the orientation time: update your profile, introduce yourself in the “Getting to Know You” forum, and indicating your choice about “Why are you taking this course?” You can’t hurt anything, click around the course homepage and explore! The orientation call with the course facilitator will be Thursday September 10 at 7:30 PM Central Time. This call will be done with a video conference tool called Zoom. You do not need to download any software in advance and instructions will be in the class site. If you do not have a camera and microphone connected with your computer you may call in by phone instead.

Weekly course guide:

Sometime Friday through Sunday...

- Watch the lectures for the session
- Read any assigned readings
- Post your thoughts in the discussion essay forum

Sunday through Tuesday

- Read the forum postings
- Respond to 2 of your classmates in the discussion essay forum with a 1-3 sentence response
- Post your thoughts in the key question forum

By Wednesday through Thursday of each week

- Read the forum postings
- In the key question forum respond to at least 2 other participants with 1-3 sentences.

Variation: Sessions 4 and 8

In these 2 sessions instead of the second forum, there will be a Zoom call for 1 hour. Time to be decided.

Final paper: due December 3, two weeks after the completion of the course sessions.

Grading:

The grading for the Getting Down to Basics course is simply pass-fail. This grade is assigned after the final paper is completed and takes into account the way you used what you learned in the course to weave together the lectures, reading and discussions in your final paper, whether you participated in the three Zoom discussions (Orientation, Session 4, and Session 8), whether you posted all your Discussion Essays and Key Question Essays in a timely manner, and whether you responded to the Discussion and Key Question posts of two colleagues in a way reflective of our class covenant.

Passing = Participation in at least 2 of the 3 Zoom calls; posting of at least 12 of the 18 essays; at least 26 responses to the essays of your colleagues; submission of a final paper integrating the course material using the guidelines for the final paper.
