Introduction to the New Testament

Orientation conference call Tuesday September 10 at 7:30 PM Central Time Sept. 13- Nov. 21, 2019

Course Description

In this course students will be introduced to key themes and issues in the study of the New Testament, and learn basic skills to equip them to be competent and creative interpreters of New Testament texts. The *Introduction to the New Testament* DVD presents a model for interpreting Scripture that emphasizes the importance of reading New Testament texts in their cultural and literary contexts with a view to relating them to contemporary cultural and ministry contexts. The course will focus on the practice of interpreting New Testament texts. Students will use the models and insights from presentations on the Select DVD to explore questions raised by the study of specific New Testament texts and then discuss how these texts continue shape our faith and practice in today's world.

Purpose and Goals of the Course

The purpose of this course is to provide an introduction to the study of the New Testament for those living out their baptismal vocation. The course is designed to provide a variety of strategies and tools for understanding the message of New Testament texts in their ancient social and religious contexts with a view to relating them to contemporary ministry contexts. The course employs learning activities that include lectures, readings, study guides, and online discussion to accomplish the following learning goals:

- Obtain a basic grasp of the content and message of the Gospels, Pauline epistles, Acts and Revelation
- To become aware of the cultural and theological assumptions you bring to the interpretation of New Testament texts and learn to ask questions of the text that allow you to hear the text anew
- To become familiar with basic strategies for interpreting New Testament texts and practice using them by interpreting specific passages discussing your interpretive work online
- To better understand how New Testament texts were responding to specific political, social and religious issues and circumstances in order to provide fresh readings of New Testament texts that speak to contemporary cultural contexts

Facilitator as Resource

The class facilitator will be familiar with the lectures and reading material, read student postings, and will be rotating the type of interface he uses with the student each week. The weeks that there are Zoom calls that will be the interface. Other weeks the facilitator will be responding to either essays or to threaded discussions or give a general written response to the issues of that week. The facilitator for this course is the Rev. Dr. Jennifer McNeel who teaches at United Lutheran Seminary, and has taught at Luther Seminary, and Union Presbyterian Seminary.

Orientation week September 9: You will be enrolled in the course site just before the orientation week. Please take this time to explore the course site. There are a number of tasks to do during the orientation time: update your profile, introduce yourself in the "Getting to Know You" forum, and indicating your choice about "Why are you taking this course?" You can't hurt anything, click around the course homepage and explore! There will also be an orientation phone call with the course facilitator will be Tuesday Sept. 10 at 7:30 Central Time. This call will be done with a videoconference tool called Zoom. You do not need to download any software in advance and instructions will be in the class site. If you do not have a camera and microphone connected with your computer you may call in by phone instead.
